Call to Confession

Family of faith, the invitation of our faith is simple.

Scripture Reading

Matthew 2:1, 13-15, 19-23 (*The Message*)

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem village, Judah territory – this was during Herod's kingship – a band of scholars arrived in Jerusalem from the East.

After the scholars were gone, God's angel showed up again in Joseph's dream and commanded, "Get up. Take the child and his mother and flee to Egypt. Stay until further notice. Herod is on the hunt for this child, and wants to kill him."

Joseph obeyed. He got up, took the child and his mother under cover of darkness. They were out of town and well on their way by daylight. They

lived in Egypt until Herod's death. This Egyptian exile fulfilled what Hosea had preached: "I called my son out of Egypt."

Later, when Herod died, God's angel appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt: "Up, take the child and his mother and return to Israel. All those out to murder the child are dead."

Joseph obeyed. He got up, took the child and his mother, and reentered Israel. When he heard, though, that Archelaus had succeeded his father, Herod, as king in Judea, he was afraid to go there. But then Joseph was directed in a dream to go to the hills of Galilee. On arrival, he settled in the village of Nazareth. This move was a fulfillment of the prophetic words, "He shall be called a Nazarene."

This is the Word of the Lord / **Thanks be to God.**

Joseph Tells His Story

The angel came again last night. I thought dreams were supposed to be weird or fantastic, not life-changing. First it was, "You're going to help raise God's son," and now it's, "Pack your things and go to Egypt." *Egypt!* We'll have to travel for weeks to get there. We'll have to find a place to live, and I'll have to find work. Even if we settle in the Jewish Quarter, will our customs be the same as our neighbors? Will we even speak the same language? I could chalk this dream up to something I ate last night. I could forget everything the angel said, pretend I didn't hear.

But then I hear a giggle from across the room. It's my son, playing with his mother, unaware of the danger we're facing if the message is real. He's worth protecting, even if it means days of walking through the desert. He did nothing to deserve the threat to his life. It's not fair to him. It's not fair to the other families Herod will rip apart to get to him. But if I can't change Herod's heart, I can at least keep our family safe.

So I'll pack our things. I'll say goodbye to the home we've built, our family, our friends, the land we've lived on for generations. And I'll head into the unknown, despite all the danger that might lie ahead. Because more than anything, he's worth protecting.

Reflection Questions

Instructions to Table Facilitators: Use the following questions to prompt conversation, connection, and wonder around the story. Allow the conversation to wander between and beyond these prompts as long as it's fruitful. Each table may move to the Prayer Activity when ready.

- How does this story make you feel? Are you angry? Scared? Sad? Hopeful?
- Mary, Joseph, and Jesus moved to Egypt to keep Jesus safe from Herod. Today, what are some reasons people leave their homes and move to another country? What might make you leave your home?
- Do you think Mary and Joseph traveled to Egypt alone, or did they go with extended family? Were other families with young children fleeing Bethlehem, too?
- What kind of help do you think Mary and Joseph needed during their journey to Egypt? What kind of help can you offer refugees where you live?
- What injustices would you like to fix in the world? What causes or movements light a fire in you to make a difference? What makes you feel excited to help others?
